## **Tech-savvy student excels in International Business & Technology program**

Tujuanna Austin's parents don't push her to do well in school—she pushes herself. She's always been driven. From her early years as a primary student in Guyana, to middle school and secondary school in Peel, Austin's determination, goal of becoming a doctor and positive outlook on life have kept her moving forward.

Since grade 7, Austin has attended the International Business and Technology (IBT) program, first at Allan A. Martin Sr. Public School in Mississauga, and now at North Park Secondary School in Brampton. The grade 12 student is incredibly involved—from sports to drama to charity work. She enjoys all aspects of school life, and the IBT program in particular.

"I think being in the program gives me an advantage," says Austin. "We're living in the information age—one that's based on access to technology. In the IBT program, technology is part of every class and assignment. We use class blogs and some of our textbooks are completely electronic. The program has kept school exciting for me.

When students come to Corsair Public School in

Mississauga, they arrive prepared to learn, and staff are ready for them. Their journey towards achievement begins in kindergarten, and continues and is supported throughout their entire school experience. At Corsair, each child's success is a top priority, and they have the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) results to prove it. Four years ago, Corsair made a strong collective

commitment to student success through a number of literacy initiatives. The results are undeniable. Since 2006-07, their grade 3 EQAO reading scores have soared by 23 per cent, grade 3 writing is up by 16 per cent and grade 3 math scores have increased by 19 per cent. "Our staff has collectively established a set of non-

negotiables in our building," says Darren Van Hooydonk, principal at Corsair. "We set high expectations for literacy and numeracy. That vision and focus—our work—begins in kindergarten. Our success is based on taking the time to learn about each student, his or her strengths and areas for improvement, and applying a school-wide focus to help boost achievement." Interested? It might seem hard to accomplish this while teaching about something like Canada's involvement in the world wars, but the Calderstone team found a way. By working with outside organizations, they've discovered that South Asians served in the Canadian armed forces during the wars. "We look for stories and illustrations that involve the cultures our students are part of—we call it

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



#### **Peel District School Board EQAO** scores increase


Percentage of all grade 6 students at or above the provincial standard (levels 3 and 4) over time


Percentage of all grade 9 students at or above the provincial standard

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




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
