2. Good News (Participation in the 25<sup>th</sup> National Conference of Music for Children – Carl Orff Canada)

3. Letter from the Minister of Education in response to Chair McDougald's letter of February 6, 2018 regarding student transportation

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Referring to Item 7.3, a trustee thanked Chair McDougald for the letter to the Minister of Education highlighting concerns regarding student transportation funding shortfall and the shortage of bus drivers. He stated that the issues need to be resolved promptly, and the response from the Ministry has been disappointing. Another trustee pointed to the fact that, this late in the school year, some students continue to miss an hour of school on a daily basis, and some teachers have to stay after school hours to look after students, because of the busing delays. The trustee indicated that Board staff have worked hard to arrive at some solutions, but the problems persist.

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## **8. Delegation of David Laing re Input on Peel DSB 2018-2019 Budget Priorities**

Using a PowerPoint presentation, David Laing delegated the Board on behalf of the Peel Safe and Active Routes to School (PSARTS) Committee to request the Board to consider creating an Active School Travel Facilitator. A copy of the delegation's presentation was provided to the Board prior to the meeting. He stated that PSARTS is comprised of community stakeholders in support of active school travel in Peel Region.

David Laing reported that an Active School Travel Facilitator will work with community partners to create and administer programs to support active school travel. He highlighted the positive effects of active school travel on school zone congestion and student health and well-being. He commented on administrative work in managing school zone traffic congestion, as well as the adverse effects on student health and well-being due to decline in youth physical activity and increased pollution and particulate levels in school traffic zones. David Laing expressed appreciation for the work by the Board in collaboration with Peel Region, and he stated that a dedicated resource for active school travel will improve the effectiveness and reach of current and future initiatives, including taking advantage of provincial funding. In concluding his presentation, David Laing requested the Board to consider funding in the 2018-2019 budget to support the creation of an Active School Travel Facilitator position, who can be the focal point for active school initiatives as well as ease pressure on principals and school administrators. Chair McDougald thanked David Laing for providing input into the budget development process.

## **9. Delegation of Carol Speers re Raising the Pride Flag at the Peel DSB**

Delegating the Board on the subject of raising the Pride flag at the Peel DSB, Carol Speers read from speaking notes which were provided to the Board earlier. She acknowledged members representing several employee resource groups and unions who were present in the audience. Carol Speers stated that raising the Pride flag at all Peel DSB locations will be a visible sign of support from the Board for people who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, Transexual and Two Spirited. She commented that the flag stands for hope and diversity, and signifies that Board locations are safe spaces, and all are welcomed. She added that the flag and rainbow symbolizes hope for a better future in terms of access, equity, and absence of violence and hostility. Carol Speers listed several school boards in Ontario that fly the Pride Flag, as well as regional and municipal institutions. Making references to the Ministry of Education's Accepting Schools Act, and the Board's Human Rights, Equity and Inclusive Education, and Safe Schools Policies, she stated that the flag will signal that Peel schools and workplaces are safe, welcoming and respectful. Carol Speers stated that equity, inclusion, and a socially just society entails working for everyone's rights and supporting each other. In conclusion, she requested the Board to consider changing the Flag Raising Policy as soon as possible to support raising of the Pride flag.

A trustee referred to earlier comments made by Carol Speers about a promise made regarding raising the Pride Flag in June 2018. Carol Speers clarified that last year, a group of employees had discussed this issue with former Associate Director of Instructional and Equity Support Services, Scott Moreash, who indicated that the Board will work on changing the Flag Raising Policy, and the group believed that discussion would be scheduled in Fall 2017. Another trustee noted that the delegation listed several school boards that fly the Flag, and he asked whether the flag is flown during the full month of June, or for specific periods of time. Chair McDougald confirmed that these details will be gathered, and she thanked Carol Speers for the delegation.

**10. Delegation of Nicole Luinenburg re Raising the Pride Flag at Peel DSB Sites**

Nicole Luinenburg introduced herself as a Peel secondary school teacher and a representative of the Pride Employee Resource Group. She read from a prepared brief which was earlier provided to the Board.

The delegation spoke about her secondary school years and the effects of growing up in an unaccepting society. Nicole Luinenburg noted that, while that was another time and place and these are better times with Peel schools having Days of Pink and Days of Silence, each year there are several teenagers whose mental health is suffering. These students struggle with the same questions she had asked herself in her youth as to whether she mattered and whether she was good. She stated that these are the same questions also weighing on many black youth, with black male students confirming that people generally had low expectations of them because of their race. For some of them the only options are self-harm and for others, it is to lose the ability to love and respect themselves, and to see themselves as part of the good in the world. Commenting on the importance of having an LGBTQ staff member, she stated that some students continue to use verbal insults, but these are rarely addressed because it is not a priority. Nicole Luinenburg stated that the Pride flag makes a public statement, which is clear show of support for a group of people, and it is a statement that Peel DSB believes that all people deserve dignity and respect because they are human beings. Indicating that equity is all or nothing, she concluded her delegation by stating that all people are equal and deserve the same rights and opportunities. Peel DSB needs to not only rise together but also stand together.

**11. Delegation of Kitty Barron and K.C. Barron re Raising the Pride Flag**

Kitty Barron and K.C. Barron delegated the Board on the subject of raising the Pride flag, and their speaking notes were provided to the Board. K.C. Barron spoke about the difficulties he faces in his friendships as a result of coming out as a transgendered person. He remarked that the world is evolving and becoming more understanding and inclusive, and that raising the flag can make schools appear safer and more comforting for students and teachers. This may help to reduce anxiety and will represent a community approach that all are included and welcome. K.C. Barron indicated that the flag represents inclusiveness, spirit, community, peace and love, and he expressed the hope that the flag will be raised.

Kitty Barron then addressed the Board, expressing appreciation for the Board actively addressing issues pertaining to equity and inclusion. She remarked that, notwithstanding the strides made to ensure safe and welcoming environments, homophobia, transphobia and biphobia still exist. Highlighting personal experiences, she stated that, as a mother, she wants her children to be happy and striving to be their best selves without fear of judgment. She spoke about the positive changes in her child, K.C. Barron's Grade 8 year when he felt safe enough to share with her his true identity. Kitty Barron explained that her child found his voice and confidence when he embraced his identity. Requesting that the Pride flag be raised next month, she stated that this will demonstrate the Board's commitment to equity and inclusion for all.

**12. Delegation of Bacinski-Skippen Family re Raising the Pride Flag at the Peel DSB**

Paul Skippen delegated the Board along with his husband, Robert Bacinski, and their son and daughter. A general brief of the delegation's presentation was provided earlier to the Board. Using a question and answer format, Paul Skippen asked his children to share their views on the importance of flying the Pride flag, his son's experience with being made fun of for having two dads, and the number of gay families they know. He noted the significant number of gay families that their family is connected to, and that family Pride is the largest Pride event. He referred to research on genetics and hormones that may point to reasons people are gay, and the research which indicates the standard of approximately 10% of the population being gay. Paul Skippen remarked that, with the mandate of education, school boards are the best place to help families navigate their children's journey to self-acceptance. He stated that the Pride flag will signal inclusion that allows LGBTQ students to connect with their community.

Thanking the delegations for their advocacy, Chair McDougald indicated that the Board has demonstrated and is proud of its ongoing commitment to equity and inclusion. Explaining that the Board is not reluctant about creating safe, caring and inclusive school spaces, she explained that, as a large and complex organization, the Board deals with many issues every day. She advised that the Board operates on policies which help to ensure fairness and consistency of processes. Stating that trustees have noted the delegations' request, Chair McDougald confirmed that a response will be brought to the next Regular Meeting of the Board.

**13. Appointment of Two Trustees (and Two Alternates) to the OPSBA Board of Directors for June 2018-2019**

At the Regular Meeting of the Board, held April 24, 2018, the Board received notice that two trustees and two alternates will be appointed at this meeting to serve on the Board of Directors of the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA) for the 2018-2019 period (from the 2018 Annual General Meeting to the 2019 Annual General Meeting).

Chair McDougald called for nominations.

There were no further nominations. Chair McDougald declared that Trustees Andrews and Green are appointed to serve as Peel's representatives on the Board of Directors of OPSBA, with Trustees Nurse and McDonald as their Alternates, for the 2018-2019 period.



## 17. Comments or Questions from Board Members

Student Trustee Pawar reported that he and Trustee Singh have been involved in presenting the Bhangra Hip Hop competition for students, scheduled on May 25, 2018 at Harold M. Brathwaite Secondary School. He noted that this is the 6<sup>th</sup> year for the competition, and he invited trustees to attend the event.

Student Trustee Mahr stated that she attended the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Hillcrest Middle School. She indicated that it was a fun event, and she thanked the school for the invitation.

Trustee Andrews expressed appreciation for the work done in schools, and reported on her attendance at the Balmoral Public School Film Festival, Dinner and Awards show. She stated that the event was impressively organized, with a photo booth, dinner service, refreshments bar, awards, and acceptance speeches.

Trustee Cameron reported that he attended the Early Years Conference, hosted by Superintendent of Education, Joy Uniac, and the Early Years team at the Jack Smythe Field Centre. He stated that the event was organized very creatively, and it was good to see so many committed Kindergarten teachers. Indicating that another conference will be held in September 2018, he encouraged trustees to attend.

Vice-Chair Nurse congratulated the team who worked on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Conference of the We Rise Together initiative. Expressing appreciation to Principal of Castlebrooke Secondary School, Rasulan Hoppie, for his work in hosting the event, she reported that it was very well attended, with the presenters and participants being engaged.

Trustee McDonald spoke about conferences on Mental Health, providing information on the sessions offered, and she thanked the organizers and presenters. She commented on the We Rise Together conference, which provided an opportunity for students and attendees to hear about different career options. She thanked staff who were involved in organizing the conference.

Trustee Green also spoke positively about the We Rise Together conference. He thanked Superintendent Uniac for the invitation to the Early Years conference, stating the event demonstrates the depth of work done in schools, which makes a difference in the lives of students. He expressed appreciation to staff for their work and encouraged trustees to attend the next conference.

Trustee MacDonald reported on the celebration of Hillcrest Middle School's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary event, and recognized Clarkson Secondary School, Glendale Public School and John Fraser Secondary School for receiving the Safe and Accepting School Award.

Chair McDougald reported that she and Trustee Lawton attended the Music Monday event at the Living Arts Centre last night. She spoke about the talented students who participated and thanked their music teachers for their hard work.
